August Council Meeting Update:

- ❑ Mr. Tom Potts made a motion to approve the 2016 Audited Financial Reports.
- ❑ Mr. Jonathan DeBor made a motion to table awarding the Garbage and Recycling Bids until the September Council Meeting.
- ❑ Mr. Bill Hartman, Jr. made a motion to approve payment request no. 1 for the First Street Waterline Replacement Project in the amount of \$119,232.95.
- ❑ Chief Lauria reported that there were 127 varied police calls in July.
- ❑ The Meeting Spot sign is up and the last space in the parking lot and the space across from it in the recycling lot have been designated for safe custody changes, on-line purchases, etc.
- ❑ Getting more parking complaints. Additional 'No Parking' signs being installed as needed.
- ❑ A Clinton Ave. resident voiced his concerns of speeding on Maple Ave and cars going the wrong way on a one way road. Council agreed to place speed bumps on Maple Ave. and paint SLOW on the road. The police will monitor the road during rush hour traffic.
- ❑ Mark Snatchko thanked everyone for their help and cooperation with the fair. They had over 200 cars show up for the car cruise The Hose Company applied for a grant and are waiting for an answer so they can order a new fire truck.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

We hear about new types of scams just about everyday, and they are only becoming more frequent and elaborate. Recently, credit and debit card skimming devices are being located on an almost daily basis. These devices are made from the same parts that are used in making the ATM machines, and easily blend in. Whenever your card passes through the reader, its saves the information from the magnetic strip to a microchip, and can later be duplicated onto another card. There are also pin pads, that are so thin, they are barely noticeable. Whenever you enter your PIN number, it uses the same microchip as the card reader to save your information, and because its so thin, the ATM pin pad is still activated, and everything works as normal. These scam artists often come at a time when they wont draw attention to themselves, and can places these devices on the machine in seconds. They will then come back a few days later to retrieve the devices, and download the information, and begin to clone your card. Although these devices blend in very well, there are still easy ways to protect yourself. By giving a small pull on the card reader or pin pad, you can see if it seems loose, or just falls off. The parts that are built into the machine should seem sturdy. If you ever notice something that doesn't seem right, stop, don't use the machine, and tell either the bank, or an employee where the machine is located so they can shut it down, and contact the police. Also, you should notify your bank, so they can check your account for suspicious activity.




Reminder: Holiday Trash Schedule & Office Hours The Borough office will be closed on Monday, September 4th, for the Labor Day Holiday.


